

Pre-Assessment Tool

Assessing impact in training is essential in ensuring participants achieve desired learning outcomes. Although the BRIDGE curriculum is an adaptable tool, there are learning outcomes for each session which can be evaluated to identify growth and examine opportunities to improve upon the learning experience.

Assessment can be conducted within the session known as embedded assessment, or through a follow-up procedure, known as post-assessment. Additionally, some campuses may wish to conduct an assessment prior to the training experience. This type of assessment is known as pre-assessment and has multiple benefits:

1. It will help you as a trainer understand the educational starting place for your participants (skills, knowledge, comfort, confidence, etc.). This will allow you to intentionally tailor the educational experience to meet their needs;
2. It will help you as a trainer understand the precise impact your training session had on participants because you have analyzed their skills, knowledge, comfort, and confidence prior to the session.

Included in this document is a set of materials to support you in creating a pre-assessment of your participants, including framing language and sample questions. Ideally, this information would be gathered well in advance of your training session allowing you an opportunity to review the data and use it to inform your curricular approach. You could also gather this data in person immediately prior to the start of the session in the interest of examining the impact of the session on participants.

FRAMING LANGUAGE

Below is sample framing you can use to provide context on the pre-assessment exercise for participants.

As we embark on capacity building efforts around religious diversity and worldview engagement, this assessment activity gathers information about your existing knowledge, skills, comfort, and competence in the area. Your honest answers will help your facilitators prepare for the session and examine learning. This information is confidential and will be used to strengthen the efficacy of this training. There are no wrong answers! Thank you in advance for your candor.

SAMPLE QUESTIONS

Below are a set of sample questions to support you in creating a pre-assessment as well as a post-assessment for your training. It is a good idea to keep the survey fairly asking only relevant, necessary and applicable questions.
